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What is the Senior Geography Project?

[SGP]

The SGP is an investigation **and** report on a geographical topic **<u>Students</u>**

- Choose a topic that interests them and which <u>you</u> agree can be investigated
- Identify the focus of the project
- Complete <u>TWO STAGES</u>

STAGE 1. Plan of Investigation

Progress of the *geographical research* that shows the *geographical inquiry* process along with Log Book

STAGE 2. Final Report

Present a final <u>Geography Report 2000</u> Words along with completed Log Book

Topic Selection

General advice to students

<u>Select</u>

- A topic you are interested in
- An area that is accessible and you are able to visit independently
- Set aside time in the School holidays Term 2 to complete much of the fieldwork and gathering of primary and secondary sources
- Keep an ongoing record of Secondary sources for the Bibliography and future reference
- Read the local paper for ideas
- Visit the local library and look in historical files about the local area
- Visit the local council and see if there are any developments planned that could be a topic
- Keep it simple

What is Ethical Research? When conducting your Geographical research you will need to keep in mind the following accepted guidelines:

- Respect confidentiality of those providing information to you. Ask permission to publish their ideas/ work
- Do not use deception to get information from people. Use the included letter to support your inquiry
- Avoid risk of harm to yourself and others when seeking data
- Obtain permission before entering property
- Minimise any damage to the environment
- Store and save your data in a safe place, have back up on your computer system. Computer failure is no excuse for inability to complete your SGP
- Acknowledge your secondary sources by labeling any material

PLAGIARISM

- Copying from books, websites, or the work of other students is stealing
- It is called plagiarism and is taken very seriously
- If it is clear that you have copied large sections of your work from other students, books or the internet, then you will be given **zero**
- It is not difficult for teachers to find false data/conclusions and/or plagiarized material. The best way to guard against plagiarism of secondary sources is to footnote wherever possible
- Primary source material is encouraged wherever possible



Collecting Data For Your SGP- Two Types of Sources

- 1. <u>Secondary</u>- information which other people have collected described and analysed
- You will find this in newspapers, reports, magazines, books radio and television
- Write down the date of when you accessed the material and the date the material was published

Where to get secondary sources-

- Local library(Local History section)
- Local Council
- Local Newspaper Office
- Information Offices of State Government Departments

2. <u>**Primary**</u>- information you collect yourself

 This can be in the form of field observation, photographs you have taken, sketches, statistics, and information from questionnaires

Where to get primary sources-

- Fieldwork, you can plot information onto maps, sketches
- Photographs prepare and carry out surveys using direct observation, interviews

STAGE 1. Plan of Investigation and submit it to be checked by your teacher; it will either be approved or advice to be given to modify

- It will involve an interview with the teacher to determine the suitability of the topic
- Submit completed Log Book so far
- <u>This Stage is worth 10%</u>

- Communicate the results and findings, including a critical review of the STAGE 1. Plan of Investigation
- Each student is required to submit
- **STAGE 2. Final Geography Report** of 2000 Words
- SGP Assessment Booklet
- Completed Log Book
